Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Justice Audit is complete. Councilwoman Eldridge offered Resolution # 5 Completion of the Justice Audit. Seconded by, Councilman Mahoney. Resolution # 5 attached herein.

**Supervisor Comments**

Supervisor Wells reported to all that he had received an introductory letter from Mark Walczyk, who will become our new Senator for NYS District 49. He reported to all with the re-districting for the Senate we ended up with a change in our districting and we are looking for a possible change in our Assembly District as well. He stated that all hearings have been concluded however, this will not happen for 2 years.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Town had received a Water Quality Improvement Grant in the amount of \$225,000.00 through NYS. This grant is for a salt shed. He stated this was a joint application with Hamilton County. He told all present this will be located at the Highway Garage.

Supervisor Wells told all that the Beach Program this summer is in dire need of lifeguards. He told all present that it is very hard to get lifeguards and there has been a problem with this all over. He told all that we did need senior guards as well as junior guards. He told all present, there are not enough lifeguards to open the beaches this year. He read a letter of resignation from Head Lifeguard, Jessica Brusio, stating she would not be coming back as she was offered a full-time job. Discussion held on lifeguards, certifications, and Senior Guards.

Supervisor Wells stated he had received the Legislative agenda from the Adirondack Towns and Villages Region D. If any of the Board members would like a copy, just let him know. Supervisor Wells Offered **Resolution # 6**, Resolution Supporting the 2023 Legislative Agenda of the Adirondack Associations of Towns and Villages. Seconded by, Councilman Rathbun. Supervisor wells reported that he had a meeting this afternoon with National Grid concerning the upcoming storm. He stated they had brought in 200 different crews in different areas. He also stated that NYSIG is also in contact with the Emergency Communications Office.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that he had a request from the Supervisor out of the Town of Homestead concerning Governor Hochuls 2024 executive budget, with a proposition to allow the State Government to override the authority of local Zoning. The NY housing compact is a plan to build over 800,000 homes statewide over the next decade. He stated there is a provision within the proposition,



that will allow NYS to ignore local Zoning Authority to achieve their target. He stated that there was an invitation as well to go to Albany on March 20<sup>th</sup> to oppose this. He stated that he is looking further into this.

#### Other Town Business

Councilman Mahoney stated he was happy that the ski program was such a success this year. He also stated that the snowmobile trails have been great.

Councilwoman Eldridge asked about an update on DEC concerning closing the camp sites earlier. Supervisor Wells stated he has not heard anything and probably would not have an update until after the Budget has been adopted. Supervisor Wells also reiterated that there is a shortage of workers.

Councilman Rathbun stated that the Weed Board would like to put wooden boxes on Adirondack Lake for boaters to pull off weeds etc.. before putting your boats in the water. Discussions were held concerning people using it as a garbage dump. The consensus was to move ahead on the boxes.

Councilman Rathbun stated he would build the boxes with the help of Bill Laprairie. Councilman Rathbun also stated that the Weed District would also like to extend their Septic Tank Removal program one more year. Supervisor Wells stated that they would need to look at the break down from last year.

Councilman Rathbun stated there is plenty of money in the Weed District fund to pay for this.

Councilman Rathbun also questioned the Bog TRP? This will be checked into.

Supervisor Wells thanked the STR (Short Term Rental) Committee, the Town Board, the Zoning Board, and the Planning Board and many interested citizens, for the great workshop that was held on March 9<sup>th</sup>. He stated that it went very well and they would be holding another workshop in a month or so. He explained to all that there is an Assembly Bill going forward that the State is looking into. However the consensus of all present was to have our own program in place. Pam Howard asked if the STR Committee had any information concerning the Draft Policy. Councilman Mahoney stated he would get her a copy.

Tiffany Scofield approached stating she wanted to bring it to the Boards attention that the skating rink was not maintained well all year and numerous times the building was not open, even though the sign stated it would be open. Bill Laprairie, Department Head of Parks and Rec. explained that first of all the weather is a big factor! He stated that this rink has a 2 inch crown in the center of it, while most rinks are flat. He stated the 2 inch crown means that as soon as the sun comes out it hits the black top, then warms the black top and therefore melts the ice. He stated that we have had mostly warm temperatures, a lot of rain, ice then loss of ice. He stated that we had lost the ice before snowcade. He also stated the building has been open and most nights and weekends and no one comes in to use the games. He also stated that it has been on the Town website and facebook that the building was closed, or open and the condition of the ice. He told all that a barricade had been put across the ice rink stating to stay off the rink and it had been removed by locals. He stated that it was mother nature that caused the conditions of the rink and nothing he and his crew can do about that. Supervisor Wells asked Tiffany



Scotfield for the dates as to when she was at the ski hut building when it was not open. Supervisor Wells reported to all that we are currently looking into how we are going to handle the fireworks next year because we have people that are on the rink with their boots (this ruins the skating rink). He stated we leave the snow on the rink during the fireworks to protect the people who are on the ice with boots. It has been discussed that the rink would be closed completely the night of the fireworks. He also stated that to re-black top the rink would be a huge expense but does agree with Bill that the 2 inch crown is not a benefit.

Supervisor Wells reiterated his previous motion to enter into Executive Session, just changing the time to 8:00 p.m. All in favor. Motion carried.

Supervisor Wells made a motion to Exit Executive Session at 8:15 p.m. Seconded by, Councilwoman Eldridge. All in favor. Motion carried.

No action taken during Executive Session.

Councilwoman Eldridge made a motion to send a letter of termination to North Creek Rafting Company stating the termination of his 100 rafting slots due to non-payment of Contractual Obligations. The company is now suspended from the Town of Indian Lake and HRPRA Rafting program. Seconded by, Councilman Rathbun.



Building maintenance and operations department head report February 2023

We finally started grooming in the month of February on a full-time basis, grooming, moose river planes, blue Mountain Lake, and headquarters trail daily, the Sabael trail was only groomed with the snowmobile due to all the openings and water hazards. when we were not grooming we were out on the trails cutting brush and filling in water holes that continuously open with our terrible weather.

We plowed and shoveled all town properties as needed, checking the walks for ice every day.

This month was our festival, and we set up numerous things for Christine. The biggest two events were the snowmobile races and the family feud. After all the events were taken care of we cleaned up all the tents, wood, and picnic tables.

We worked in shop welding on drags and doing maintenance as needed. Due to the lack of snow we have been doing a lot of repairs to equipment and drags. We have also done our normal maintenance on trucks, snowblowers, and plows.

We've had to make parts runs to Amsterdam, Albany, Vermont, for groomers, loaders, and to pick up a new brush hog.

This month the dump loader dropped a main engine line and was taken to Milton Cat for repairs, while we had it there we started looking at the possibility of trading. I have been talking with a different salesman and looking at different loaders on state contract and ones that will fit all of our attachments we already have.

Keeping ice on the skating rink has been a challenge this year with all the warm temperatures, we run the building in the evenings and weekends until we lose the ice, we have had to start over four times this year and every time we get it where it's nice we get rain and warm temperatures. We lost the rink on march 3<sup>rd</sup> and do not believe we will try to put water back on it again.

Started building a new shed for the highway garage to replace the one that is there that is falling apart, Ken, Gene, and a few guys from the highway department. have worked on it this past month.

Testing was completed daily at all 3 plants.


DOH and DEC monthly samples were submitted to the lab.

We have been having problems with one of the filters in Blue. We rebuilt a valve and have it working again. We found the valve we needed on a Ebay surplus and are waiting on it.

**Community/Economic Development**

Main Street America (MSA) Committee – The ILCDC hosted a membership meeting on 2/15/23 at the Town Hall. I provided the attendees with a PowerPoint presentation re: the group's revitalization efforts.

NYSERDA Clean Energy Update – No new news to report.

Irish Road Bowling hosted by the Snowwarriors again this year will be held on Saturday, March 18, at 10AM starting at the Indian Lake Beach on Chain Lakes Road. Registration forms are available at the Chamber of Commerce.

The ILCS Career, Skills & Trade Readiness and Town of Indian Lake Job Fair will be held on Friday, March 24 and Saturday, March 25 at the ILCS. This is a partnership with the school to promote local trades/jobs available on Friday to ILCS students in Grades 6-12. This 1.5-hour event will consist of a panel presentation by local business owners and be followed by a chance for students to talk one-on-one with businesses which interest them. On Saturday, there will be a job fair from 9AM to 4PM. This event is open to any of our local businesses seeking employees.

**Events – 2023**

SNOCADE's most successful and well attended events continue to be the Kitty Kat Snowmobile races and the Grand Finale event with Fireworks. We had 25 children participate in the snowmobile races. Hot dogs and milk were provided free by Stewart's Shops. Community members provided chili. The Town provided hamburgers, rolls, condiments, and donuts. Not all hotdogs were cooked at the races so I was able to serve hot dogs at the Grand Finale event along with all the regular fare.

The Cardboard sled races were cancelled due to severe wind chill temperatures.

The Horse Drawn Wagon rides were moved up by one day and even with the date and time changes, we had 55 riders.

The Ice Water Rescue performed by the ILVFD always draws a crowd of folks who are appreciative of the volunteer firemen's efforts.

The Ice Carving event had a small but very interested crowd. It was amazing to see four 50lb blocks of ice transformed into our SNOCADE logo in less than 1.5 hours. I believe we may have additional businesses signing up to have their logos carved next year.

The ILCS Tricky Tray was welcomed back this year, well supported with donations, and attended by many. We donated logo items for the event. It worked out well that this event was on the first Friday of SNOCADE as there were no other competing activities.

Family Feud was a huge hit and all in attendance noted they hope the theater will offer up this game show again at other times during the year. Thomas Ross was welcomed back as the host of the game show.

Having a weeklong+ event and managing it with little to no volunteers is becoming difficult. I plan to review attendance at all events and determine how to condense the timeframe to possibly four days (weekends only) vs. eight days). I will also be polling the businesses to see if placemats are useful or not.

I received all positive comments except for one re: the cancellation of the Cardboard Sled Races. Folks in attendance continue to be a mix of locals, seasonal residents, and visitors. This is truly a hallmark Indian lake event.

Community Pride Day, now in its 23<sup>rd</sup> year, will be happening in various Adirondack communities on Wednesday, May 3, 2023. I have started promoting the event to secure sponsors and volunteers. Information is available online, at Town Hall and at The Welcome Center.

Black Fly Challenge planning continues monthly. Friday, June 9 will be set up at Byron Park and the race starts the next day at 10AM. Registration for the event is now open and discounted at: <https://www.bikereg.com/blackflychallenge>. All the necessary traffic and safety control parties have been contacted and are committed to supporting this event. I submitted the NYSDOT Perm 33a on 3/7/23. Porta potties have been ordered. Next task will be volunteer recruitment.

Music in the Park & Other Locations (Welcome Center) performers have been booked for 2023 and contracts have been mailed out. Specifics can be found at [www.indianlakeadk.com/events](http://www.indianlakeadk.com/events). A rack card will be produced within the next month for distribution.

Indian Lake Paint Out! The second annual plein air painting event is scheduled for August 18-20. I will be applying for a grant through NYSCA's Adirondack Quad County Region Statewide Community Re-grants to help offset the cost of the instructor. Application is due March 28. More details will follow.

Rustic & Artisan Street Fair – save the dates - September 9 and 10.

Adirondack Antiques September 13-17. Last year I joined AntiquesTrail.com as a member and advertised our show. AntiqueTrail.com is an online antique store and show directory, which includes a website, photo tour, description, and map for 1,557 antique and vintage shops, malls and shows. Brochure/maps are in various welcome centers of 27 states. In addition, the map indicates where antique shows are in the states they serve.

This year they developed the New York Antique Trail.com. Our online banner ad New York Antique Trail - Directory of Antique Shops and Antique Malls can be viewed here. Our show listing here: AntiqueTrail.com. A hard copy of the map is in your mailbox which you'll see our Indian Lake Show on the front cover advertisement. They also link everything back to our webpage and provide social media links as well. I am hoping to visit some of the bigger shows our vendors keep mentioning to me to learn more about their setups, recruit vendors and get our advertisements placed at those shows. (Brimfield Antiques LLC – Brimfield, MA) Other marketing materials will be developed and distributed as needed and closer to the time of the show. Most of the postcards we order are provided to the antique vendors so they can distribute them at other shows they attend prior to ours.

### Grants

- The Charging Station Grant awards will be announced in the 1st quarter of 2023. I sent an email to find out if there are any updates.
- Pending grant projects included the following:
  - **ESD Market NY funds have been received as reported verbally at the last board meeting.**
  - DEC Hamlets Gateway grant timeline and budget modifications are being sent to DEC this week.
  - DEC Cunningham Land Acquisition is in the close-out process. Distribution of funds (\$200,000) to us is TBD.
  - We are still waiting for two DASNY Member Item grants to be processed. One for \$2.5M for Lake Adirondack Dam and the other for \$300,000 Townsend Garage purchase. DASNY is slow in providing any details re: when we can expect to receive these payments. This is a subject I discuss with Labella during each call.
  - The grant for DEC Byron Park Improvements also needs modifications and is pending as it is tied directly to the Lake Adirondack Dam project.
- Grants we applied for to date:
  - Adirondack Foundation – APPLIED. Funding requested for Ski Hut Community center to replace pool, foosball, and ping pong tables. Requested \$3,275. Awards announced in April.
  - Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance – APPLIED but upon submission the funder emailed back and indicated they were not offering grants during this cycle.
  - DEC High Hazard Rehabilitation Grants – submitted a total grant project of \$177,958.63 with a request for \$100,000. Awards announced in April 2023.

I would like to take this time to express a sincere thank you, for allowing Community Action (Indian Lake NOC) usage of the freezer located at the Welcome Center (old Stewarts building). There's no way to express just how grateful we are other than sharing a few examples of how, without the extra freezer space, food would have been wasted and our food costs would have been more exorbitant than they are now, which has nearly tripled since April 2022.


Most of the time we utilize the freezer when there is a slight overflow from our delivery, which we can't handle. However, in August there was a huge mixup between the order we placed, what was shipped from the Regional Food Bank of NENY and what was delivered here from our main office, in Warren county. With an extra two tons of frozen food, which couldn't be returned, we were very fortunate to utilize the freezer. If not for this option the food would have been thrown out.

Due to the ability to use the freezer we purchased as many turkeys as we could, through the Regional Food Bank of NENY, at sixteen cents per pound in October. We had enough turkeys to cover Thanksgiving as well as for families who wanted one for Christmas.

Mid November we became aware of the fact that the warehouse at the Regional Food Bank of NENY would be closed the Friday before the New Year, not the Monday following. Thereby, leaving us without an option to receive an order in January. As a result we purchased more frozen food than usual, in December to tide us over, because we knew there was freezer space available.

Having the ability to store any overflow we might have in the freezer, has been very favorable not only to Darci and I but for all those within Hamilton County who utilize our food pantry. We are greatly appreciative for the generosity the town has offered us.

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Water Quality Improvement Project (WQIP) program provides important support to communities to protect and restore water resources. We are pleased to inform you that the Town of Indian Lake and Hamilton County Shared Salt Shed project has been selected to receive up to \$225,000 through the WQIP program. If you applied for funding from other programs or other State agencies, you will receive information from those programs/agencies separately.

The Office of State Comptroller (OSC) must approve DEC's documentation of the project solicitation and review process before we can begin the steps to execute a contract with you. When we receive OSC's approval, we will provide additional information to assist you in getting a contract in place. Upon receipt of this additional information, DEC and OSC expect that contracts will be executed within 90-120 days. Contracts for WQIP projects will be completed through the NYS Grants Gateway (<https://grantsgateway.ny.gov/>).

Several steps must be completed by your organization to meet this timeframe. We recommend visiting the Grants Management website at <https://grantsmanagement.ny.gov/resources-grant-applicants> to become familiar with the Grants Gateway and the contracting process.
