Citizen of the Year – Sue Montgomery Corey – Resolution # 3

Supervisor Wells read Resolution # 3, honoring Sue Montgomery Corey as Citizen of the Year. Resolution # 3 is attached herein. Supervisor Wells spoke of the respect he held for Sue in the years he had worked with her. Terry DeArmas also stood and spoke as to why Sue was deserving of this award. Terry's speech is attached herein. Supervisor Wells also told all present that in Sue's honor, a plaque would be put on the chair that Sue always sat in during the Town Board meetings.

Department Head Reports/Additions

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the meter at the Indian Lake Water Plant has not been working and needs to be done manually. Patrick Mahoney, Department Head of Sewer and Water, explained that the meter is not communicating with the water plant, so the water plant does not know when to come on and off unless they go down and do it manually. Bill Laprairie, Department Head of Buildings and Grounds, approached the Board requesting permission to begin looking for a loader for the Transfer Station. He stated that he had enough money in his fund balance and the general fund so we would basically be getting out of only paying roughly \$70,000.00. Supervisor Wells questioned if this was anything under State bid. Bill replied that he is looking for 3 quotes.

Bill Laprairie, Department Head of Buildings and Grounds, approached the Board with a request to purchase a brush hog and a chain saw in order to maintain the ski hut trails. He stated these can be purchased through the Indian River Acquisition Grant. He reported to the Board that he has received quotes and recommends purchasing the brush hog from H&M Equipment and the Chain Saw from Village Motorsports.

Supervisor Wells stated that he would like the Board to consider as well amending the procurement policy to raise the limit for the Buildings and Grounds Department as well as the Water and Sewer Department up to \$5,000.00 the same as the highway is given. He stated with the rising costs this is necessary for them to purchase quickly when there is a problem and not having to wait for a Board meeting and allowing Department Heads to be pro-active. Supervisor Wells made a motion to raise the limit for purchases up to \$5,000.00 for the Buildings and Grounds Department and the Water and Sewer Department. Seconded by, Councilman Rathbun.

Supervisor Wells made a motion to allow Bill to begin looking into purchasing the Brush Hog and Chain Saws and in order to comply with the Indian River Acquisition Grant that his motion be put into the form of a Resolution and stated this needed to be done now as there it is time sensitive. Seconded by, Councilman Mahoney. **Resolution # 4** giving permission for the purchases. **Resolution # 4** is attached herein.

Bill also thanked the Sewer and Water Department and the Highway Department for all their help and letting him use their backhoe.

Christine Pouch, E.D.M & Events Manager, approached the Board stating that Bill Murphy had donated an amplified portable lectern which she explained is a microphone, and Kim Ameden donated a fire place and Christmas decorations for the welcome center. She also reported to the Board that the Town had received the Market NY Grant in the amount of \$67,500.00. This grant was to pay for the Town's Website and the Branding of the Town. Christine also reported to the Board that she has been working with David Hughes from Newcomb and they are in the process of putting in an emergency safety box on the snowmobile trail which will hold a blanket, 1st aid supplies, and told all that this is also a spot that has Wi-Fi. She reported that the cost was \$289.00. She also told all that the Blue Mt. Lake Fire Department donated the supplies for the box. This is being placed at the Hamilton County Essex snowmobile Kiosk.

Public Comments/Concerns

Andy Coney approached the Board requesting permission to hold the two annual races again this year and would once again be needing the Blue Mt. Lake Public Beach. One will be held on July 23rd and the other on August 13th. He is requesting support from the Town Board. Supervisor Wells stated that the Board will support both events.

Jack Valentine approached the Board stating he would like to publicly thank Donald Liddle for all his assistance helping the Legion with their cans and bottle group. He stated that he is always there to assist them. Robin DeArmis stated the whole group is very helpful!!!

Thank you Letter – Adk. Lake Center for the Arts

Supervisor Wells told all that he had received a thank you letter from Adk. Lake Center for the Arts thanking the Board for their continued support.

Short Term Rental Workshop – March 9th

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Town Board, Planning Board and Zoning Board would be holding a workshop on March 9th at 7:00 p.m. concerning Short Term Rentals. He stated that the State has come out with some legislation concerning this as well. He stated this may be something the State can take off our plate or something the Town will take on. He stated there will be a cost associated with this and he does not want to duplicate what the State will be requiring of us.

Section 284 – Agreement to Spend Highway Funds

Jamie Roblee, Highway Superintendent, stated that he is not sure what the cost of black top will be. He also stated that this would depend on the culvert expenses. Supervisor Wells made a motion to sign the Section 284. Seconded by, Councilman Mahoney. Councilman Rathbun stated he felt it was incomplete as it states on the first page he was setting aside \$667,393.00 but the back page states the cost of doing the Jerry Savarie Rd. would be \$93,985.00. Supervisor Wells explained to him that the first amount is for all primary work and general repairs, such as plowing and sweeping and that is the amount Jamie Budgeted for all road work, the second page and amount for Jerry Savarie Road is only for the roads that are a black top project. Jamie explained that the blank lines on the front page are just for the black top project which is on the back page.

Thank you Letter 9th Battalion

Supervisor Wells stated that he had received a thank you letter from the 9th Battalion thanking the Town for the use of the Byron Park Building.

Supervisor Comments

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Governor's Budget has a proposal in there setting aside one million dollars for the five Towns which was loosely written for infrastructure and environmental use. He stated this could be tossed out at the last minute.

He also stated that he had met with DEC concerning the continuation of our Community Connector Trails that he feels was started in 2011 -2013. He stated that DEC has released a draft force preserve work policy. He stated this is a result of the unfortunate decision that was rendered on the tree cutting lawsuit. He told all that you may comment up until February 27th. He stated you could mail Peter Frank at 625 Broadway, Albany NY or go on the DEC website.

Supervisor Wells stated that there is a scheduled meeting with DEC concerning the Camp Grounds early closure on February 21st. He stated that DEC, like all businesses are having a staff shortage, and of course due to this a safety concern for the patrons. Supervisor Wells stated he thought the problem was the way they rolled it out. He stated they should have invited Municipal Governments into the discussions. He stated that February 21st is a Hamilton County Board of Supervisors Committee Day and DEC will be coming in to do a presentation.

Supervisor Wells told all that the NYS Independent Redistricting Commission 2023 has been holding public hearings concerning the redistricting of the NYS Assembly District that will be Indian Lake and Long Lake has been taken out of Assemblyman Smullen's District and put into Assemblyman Billy Jones. He told all that you can go online to the Redistricting Committee 2023 Public Hearings you can review the draft plan and submit comments.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that he had been on a Zoom Meeting on February 9th with the Blue Mt. Lake Association. Among things discussed was the shortage on Lifeguards. Supervisor Wells reported to all that this year we are in dyer straits for the Beaches as we only have one Senior Guard and one other Guard. He explained that even if we can get enough Lifeguards needed it will not help us this year, as first year guards need to be with a Senior Guard unless they are 18 years of age and up. Blue Mt. Lake Association also questioned cleaning of the restrooms throughout the summer. Supervisor Wells stated he had spoke with out cleaning contractor, however, he does not go to Blue Mt. anymore and is not interested. Supervisor Wells also stated that they had discussed the Salt Task Force, he stated that as of now, it has not yet been released.

Supervisor Wells stated that Cedarwood is waiting on the Engineers files so they can start the paperwork with the APA concerning the Adirondack Lake Dam Project.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the annual inspection report came back for both Water 1 & Water 2 Districts and all was good.

NYSAC (New York State Association of Counties) released the Summary of the State of the State 2023 Budget. Supervisor Wells has a copy of this if anyone would like to see it.

Other Town Business

Councilman Rathbun stated that the Weed District Board held a meeting, and they were asking about the Adirondack Dam Project target date. Supervisor Wells stated there is no update. He stated that more issues cropped up concerning the bottom of the Dam. He stated that it goes across the road and when the new road went in it had been cut into. Supervisor Wells will reach out to Chazen Labella for an update.

Councilman Rathbun questioned Bill Laprairie, Department Head of Buildings and Grounds, as to when he would be looking at the Bog at Ernie Pollmans. Bill stated that he had spoke in detail with Ernie concerning this and would try as soon as he can. Councilman Rathbun stated that the Weed District do have money in their budget so if he needed a saw to cut it the Weed District can pay for it. Bill stated he has the saw.

Pay Bills/Abstracts

Supervisor Wells made a motion to pay the bills and abstracts as presented. Seconded by, Councilwoman Eldridge.

Monthly report January 2023 building maintenance and operations

Shoveled and salted walks daily and as needed for all town buildings, plowed all town buildings as needed including the transfer site. Pushed all banks back at the shop with backhoe, cleared off the front lawn to be ready for snocade parking. Cleaned out all the snowmobile trail entrances with backhoe.

Transfer site loader blew a main antifreeze line , we spent two days getting it back together with the help of Greg from the highway we lifted the machine with their loader and we're able to get the hose connected once again, after running the machine for two days the hose came off again, the machine was taken to Milton Cat by the county, and we are waiting to hear what the problem is.

Snowmobile grooming has been tough, we have been able to groom moose river planes a little bit here and there but there is still not enough snow in the woods to go Every day, we find ourselves still fixing ice holes, mud holes, and other hazards that have come up.

We built a door for our mart that will allow light in and help keep the building warm, helped Kathy put up insulation and some shelving

A lot of maintenance has been going on in the shop, servicing the snowmobile's, maintenance of side-by-side's, truck oil changes, brakes, repairing of drags. A small drag for behind the Viking was brought in and welded, The ram was relocated and rewired.

We have maintained the ice rink, and we are putting water down as needed, the building has been open every night and weekend, with the exception of Wednesdays and Thursdays when it's closed for watering and maintenance, we have had many people come play games as well as skate.

Our landscape trailer is getting tired, the gate broke and I spent a day welding and modifying it.

Installed the last of our LEDs that needed to be changed out at the Ambulance garage and the assembly room, now all town buildings are full LED lighting.

Put up banners for Christine and we have been working on signage for all of our trails that were in need of repair.

We replaced the surge suppression valve on finish pump #2 at the IL plant.


We had a large water main break in Blue Mt that was repaired with no interruption to service.

Report

Community/Economic Development

Main Street America (MSA) Committee – On Jan. 25, we had 31 Zoom participants attend out of a total of 70 email invitations. We are now working on recruiting volunteers to work in one of the four working groups: Economic Vitality, Design, Promotion and Organization. The ILCDC is hosting their February meeting on 2/15/23, at which time I will present the same PowerPoint presentation again for those who could not attend the last Zoom meeting. The meeting will be held at the Town Hall in the large assembly room at 7PM. All are invited to attend.

In addition, I assisted the ILCDC in submitting another grant application to the Adirondack Foundation's Generous Act Fund for \$7,500 for technical assistance and seed money for revitalization projects.

NYSERDA Clean Energy Update – No new news to report.

Irish Road Bowling, hosted by the Snowwarriors will be held on Saturday, March 18, at 10AM starting at the Indian Lake Beach on Chain Lakes Road. Registration forms are available at the Chamber of Commerce.

The Career, Skills & Trade Readiness & Job Fair will be held on Friday, March 24 and Saturday, March 25 at the ILCS. This is a partnership with the school to promote local trades/jobs available on Friday to ILCS students in Grades 6-12. This 1.5-hour event will consist of a panel presentation by local business owners and be followed by a chance for students to talk one-on-one with businesses which interest them. On Saturday, there will be a job fair from 9AM to 4PM. This event is open to any of our local businesses seeking employees.

Events – 2023

Lake Placid 2023 FSU World University Games I heard from MANY people these events did not help local businesses. The owner of Beck's in North Creek said they did the same amount of business the previous year without the games. He felt the FISU games kept locals away as they thought it might be too busy. Our local businesses did not see any uptick in business either. I also heard the only times it was busy in Lake Placid or at Gore was on the weekends.

- The Charging Station Grant awards will be announced in the 1st quarter of 2023. Still waiting to hear.
- Pending grant projects included the following:
 - **ESD Market NY is finally CLOSED. Funds of \$67,500 should be received within the week.**
 - DEC Hamlets Gateway grant needs to have a timeline and budget modification processed by DEC.
 - DEC Cunningham Land Acquisition will be heading into the close-out process. Distribution of funds TBD.
 - We are still waiting for two DASNY Member Item grants to be processed. One for \$2.5M for Lake Adirondack Dam and the other for \$300,000 Townsend Garage purchase. DASNY is slow in providing any details re: when we can expect to receive these payments.

- The grant for DEC Byron Park Improvements also needs modifications and is pending as it is tied directly to the Lake Adirondack Dam project.
- Grants we can apply for in 2023 included:
 - **Adirondack Foundation – APPLIED. Funding requested for Ski Hut Community center to replace pool, foosball and ping pong tables. Requested \$3,275. Awards announced in April.**
 - Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance –due 2/25/2023. Projects sought are to create and/or enhance local efforts to increase the community benefit of outdoor recreation. The maximum award is \$5,000. Project ideas (ski hut trails).
 - DEC High Hazard Rehabilitation Grants – due 2/10/2023. Minimum award is \$25,000 and Maximum is \$100,000. (Proposed project is the Adirondack Lake Dam)
